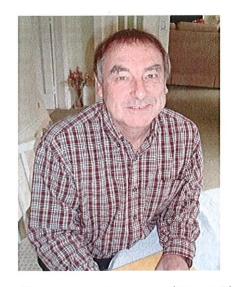

# Foreword and comment from the Friendship Project's new Chairman John Hancock



"Long experience working with young people and their families has left me in no doubt that lack of friendship, poor self-esteem and confidence are amongst the biggest handicaps in life. My interest in the Friendship Project stems from these observations and my intention is to serve the Project in whatever ways I can to help youngsters overcome such formidable barriers and I will use my professional experience for the benefit of the Project.

The Friendship Project is currently in transition preparing for some significant developments. New Trustees are needed to face the challenges ahead and to replace some of our long-serving members who are wishing to stand down after providing admirable service to the Charity.

Following research into the operation of the Project, coupled with the introduction of a Quality Assurance

System, a three year strategic plan is being prepared to assist those developments and attract additional funding and human resource. One of our aims is to recruit a Project Manager who will play a lead role in all the major functions of the Charity. We would also wish to enhance the role and remuneration of our Area Coordinators who are central to the success of the project.

Whilst retaining a degree of independence we are seeking to build stronger partnerships with Social Services (our main ally) and also with other agencies/organizations such as 'Positive About Young People', CVS, Leisure and Amenities Departments of District Councils and the University of Warwick.

Our operation at the University has been resurrected and is progressing well under the umbrella of Warwick Volunteers. Students at a recent recruitment fair showed considerable interest in our Project. Some of these same students will be befriending youngsters referred to us by Charter Primary and Sherbourne Fields Special Schools in addition to specific Social Worker teams in Coventry.

In September we held our first Annual Conference (reported in this issue) which provided the opportunity for Trustees, Coordinators and Older Friends to work together. With the expertise and commitment shown by these people and by others unable to attend, the Project can look forward to suc-

I look forward to working with you all in the future, and as Chairman would hope to be approachable to individuals, pro-active and responsive to the needs of the Project."

# Volunteers share some of their experiences

"I have been an Older Friend for over three years, becoming interested through a newspaper article. My first friendship was with a young girl aged II; she has a younger sibling with a debilitating illness, she was a great help to her mother and our friendship gave her some time for herself. We would often go shopping, visit craft fairs or go for a meal. She is now of an age that she spends more time with her school friends so the friendship has more or less finished although I am still in contact with the family.

My current friendship is with a six year old boy who again has a sibling with a complicated medical condition that requires much care and attention, also, his father is not around at the moment. We try to go out every Sunday and I am trying to teach him how to swim (which is proving more difficult than I thought!). I have secured a close bond with the boy and his mother is very happy with the friendship. One thing that I found very touching was when we were out eating pizza one day he put his hand over mine and said "You're my friend aren't you"? Surely that epitomizes what the Friendship Project strives to achieve".

"I have recently become an Older Friend to a 12 yearold-girl whose parents both have mental health problems. She has an older brother and a sister who has taken on the role of carer for the whole family. So far we have enjoyed numerous outings including swimming, walking and best of all talking. She is now attending our local church youth club and is learning the ancient art of campanology. As well as these outings I have been able to assist her with her schooling as she has been excluded from school for retaliating to taunts about her family".

" I have been a friend of Amanda's for one year. She is ten years old. We have done several activities together, but right from the start she showed an interest in pony We have had our ups and downs with various ponies but she has coped with the difficulties well. Her first pony unfortunately died just after she started and this was difficult for her. Her second pony was a winner. She entered a fancy dress as Little and Large, the pony is black and white and my little dog is black and white. Amanda, smartly dressed, rode the pony and the dog had a doll rider on his back. To Amanda's amazement she was first and won a bright red rosette! couraged with this success she then undertook pony care to win a brownie pony care badge. We have been to the Butterfly Farm and on lots of country walks with three dogs.

At first Amanda did not interact well with other children preferring adults and dogs but in the last few weeks she seems to be opening out. Amanda is a great artist and she has drawn pictures of all the horses and has made a plaque to go above her pony's tack. Yes she has fallen off two or three times but has always clambered back on".

"For 31 years as a Speech and language Therapist I chose to work predominantly with children. I have none of my own. In 1988, I bought a house with a garden and planned to adopt or foster children. After attending introduction meetings for both, I concluded, reluctantly, that I had not got the stamina nor emotional strength to cope with either on a 24/7 basis.

Then I saw an advertisement for the Friendship Project and since 1990 I have enjoyed sharing outings and activities with 4 younger friends, three girls and a boy. "Judith

"I started meeting up with my I3 year old younger friend just over a year ago and we got along instantly. Our initial outings consisted of bowling, ice skating, Brush and Bisque' It, live music, dinners and cinema.

She confides in me regarding her mum's health, her fears that she may have to go back into care and her family ups and downs in general. At the moment she has just started 'going out' with a boy from a local school and so is ecstatic. It is strange being privy to all that goes on in a 13 year olds mind but an education none the less. All in all I think she really appreciates the time we spend together and she is a pleasure to take out". Anna

"I am a Social Worker in the Rugby Short Term Team and regularly make use of the Friendship Project for a diverse range of children in terms of their age, circumstances and their need. In this sense the Friendship Project is extremely useful as the volunteers are flexible and can offer a service to the children in the way it best suits the family. I have observed friendships working well for most families and in some cases making a key contribution to helping children and their families make positive changes".

# **Fundraising Facts**

The Friendship Project is largely operated by volunteers, but there are considerable costs to meet and these have to be met by fund raising. Office costs, insurances, expenses of Coordinators and Older Friends along with advertising and publicity are expected to be in the region of £30,000 in the current year.

The small team of fund raisers, John Newbery, John Vallis and myself Brian Rush, meet regularly to review the progress of income. Appeals are made

to Trusts, Charities and Iocal firms as well as individuals. We have been fortunate to receive support from Lloyds TSB, Stratford Town Trust, Noel Buxton Trust, Alan Edward Higgs Charity, John Vallis, Kenilworth Sporting Club, King Henry VIII Endowed Trust, BBC Children in Need as well as many others to whom we are very grateful.
